Selecting the right path for your home, budget, and timeline

Path A: Full Custom Construction

The Scenario

Current layout is dysfunctional, boxes are failing, or you desire a complete architectural redesign.

The Timeline

4 to 8 weeks (Fabrication to Install).

The Investment

Kitchens: \$10,000–\$35,000.
Vanities: \$2,000–\$7,000.

Path B: Cabinet Refacing

The Scenario

The current layout works perfectly, but the exterior is dated or you are staging the home for a faster sale.

The Timeline

3 to 5 days.

The Investment

Kitchens: \$5,000–\$17,500 — approximately 50% of the cost of full replacement.

Transforming a period of waiting into a period of active anticipation



Alternative Path: Cabinet refacing bypasses this sequence, completing in just 3-5 days.

Week 1: Translating vision into exact architectural measurements

What the Craftsman is Doing



Conducting exact on-site measurements down to the millimeter.



Drafting the final layout and material selection plan.



Drafting the contract with an itemized quote separating materials versus labor.

What the Homeowner is Doing



Finalizing layout decisions.



Signing the contract and securing the fabrication spot.



Quality Checkpoint: Unlicensed Contractors

Before signing, verify active licensing (AL Home Builders Licensure Board or NC General Contractors Board) and insurance coverage. One bad install costs far more than the initial savings.

Selecting materials engineered for Alabama and North Carolina climates



Maple

Kiln-dried, very stable in high humidity, light color.

Ideal for: Painted kitchens.



Oak

Very stable in humidity, prominent grain, classic heritage.

Ideal for: Traditional and stained kitchens.



Hickory

Hardest US domestic hardwood, very stable, dramatic grain.

Ideal for: Rustic/transitional styles (The Catawba Valley furniture-capital favorite).



Cherry

Moderate stability, furniture-grade, darkens beautifully with age.

Ideal for: Period and formal kitchens.



Walnut

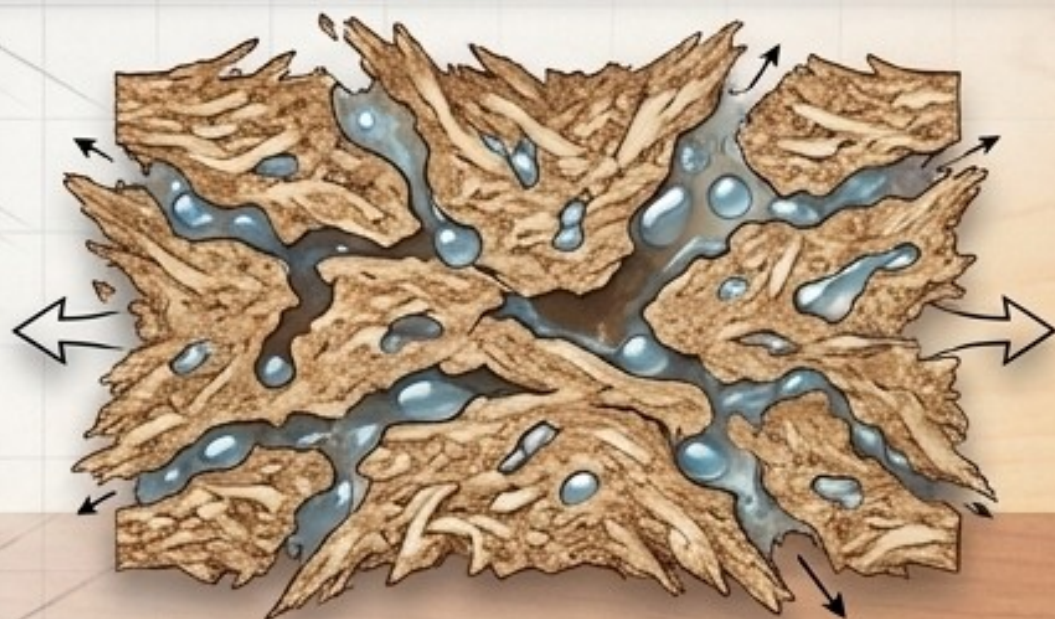
Highly stable, rich dark tone, premium tier.

Ideal for: Modern luxury.

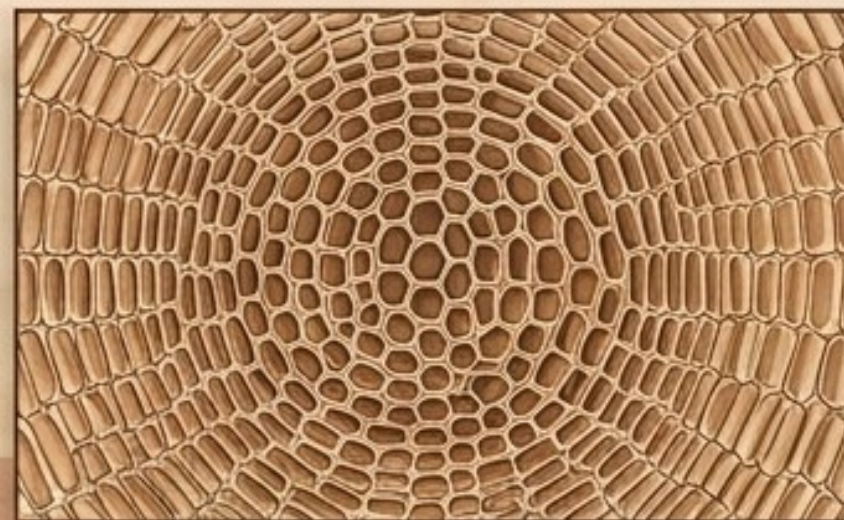


Warning: Avoid unfinished pine (dents easily) and standard MDF in wet zones.

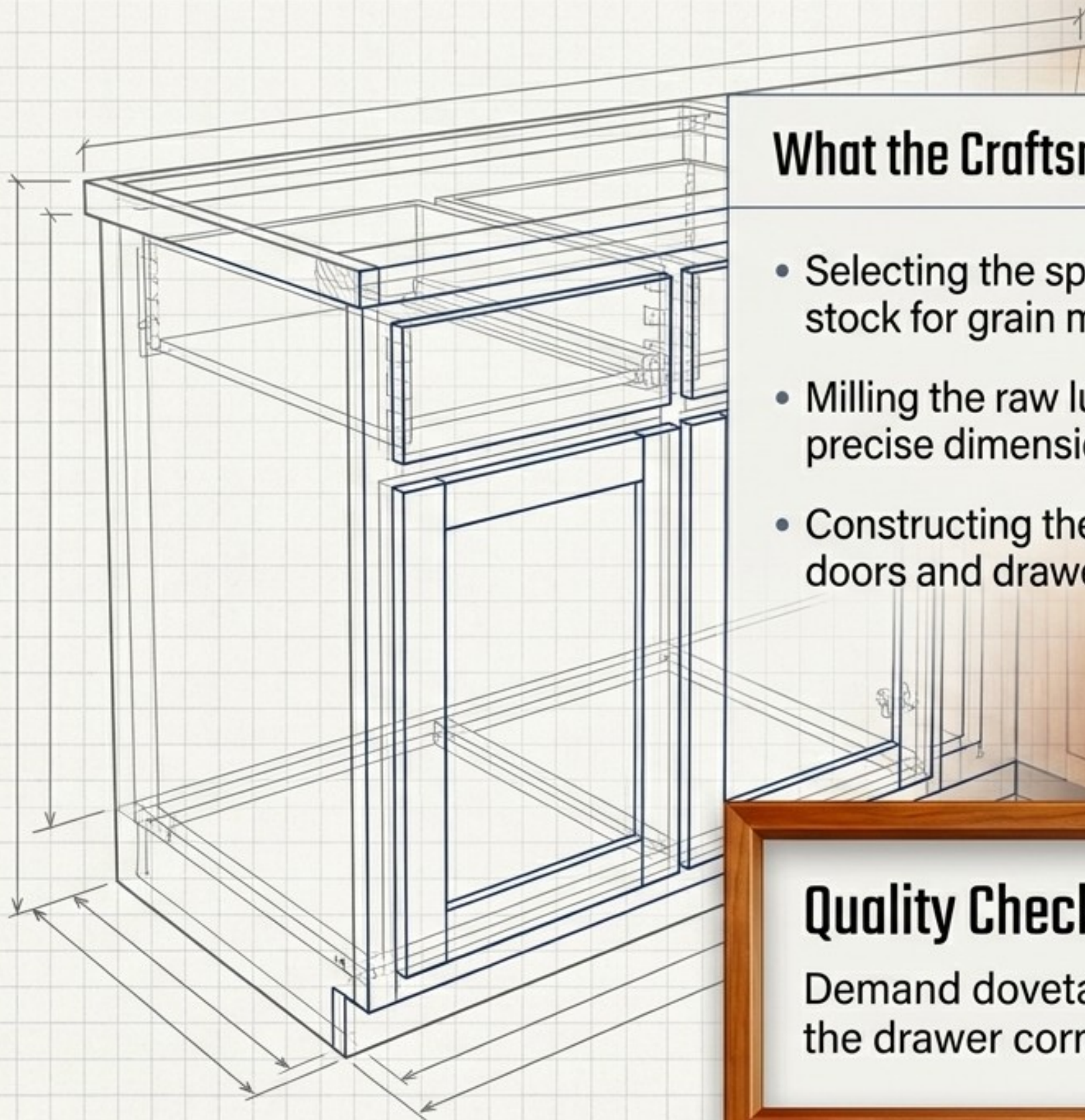
Particle Board



Kiln-Dried Solid Hardwood

Bargain quotes often rely on particle board boxes. When exposed to intense Birmingham and Hickory summer humidity, particle board acts like a sponge. The edges swell, the structural integrity warps, and hinges tear out under the weight of the doors.

True custom craftsmen exclusively utilize kiln-dried solid hardwoods that acclimate perfectly to the local environment, ensuring your cabinetry lasts for generations, not just seasons.



What the Craftsman is Doing

- Selecting the specific wood stock for grain matching.
- Milling the raw lumber to precise dimensions.
- Constructing the primary doors and drawer boxes.

What the Homeowner is Doing

- Finalizing and ordering appliance dimensions so cabinet box openings can be custom-fitted.

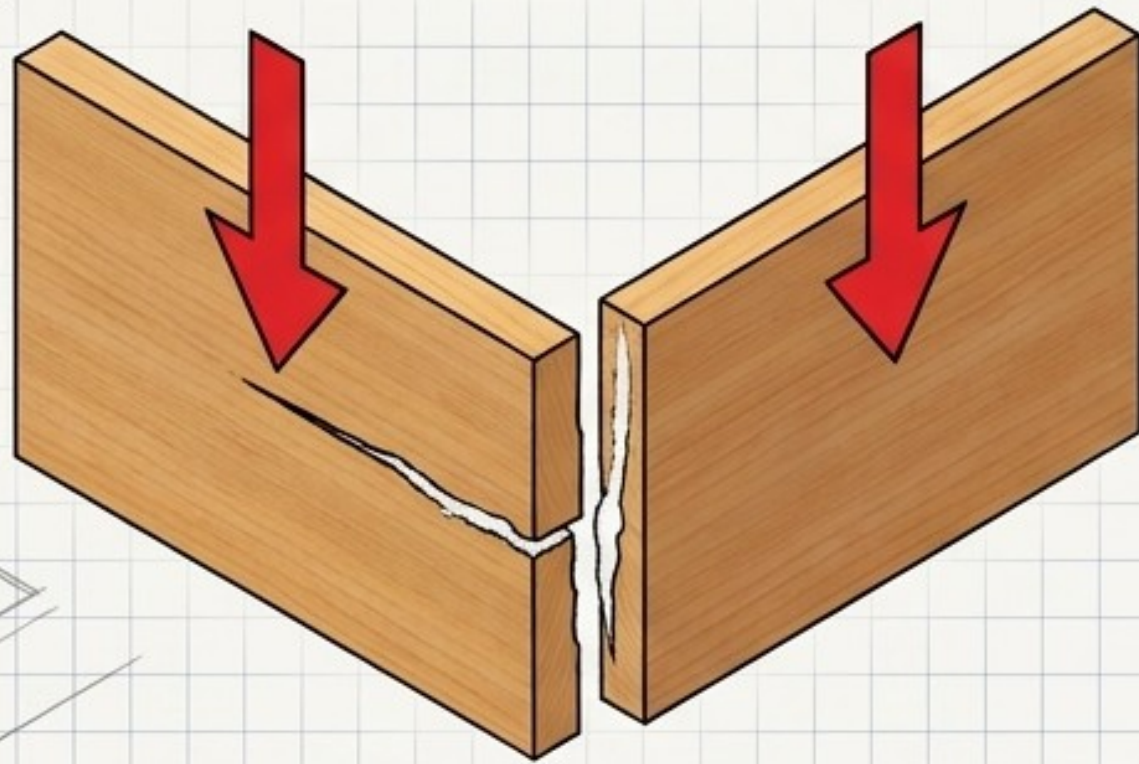
Quality Checkpoint: The Joinery Trap

Demand dovetail joinery. Cheap glued butt joints fail rapidly at the drawer corners under the heavy weight of pots and pans.

Why heritage craftsmanship relies on mechanical strength over adhesives

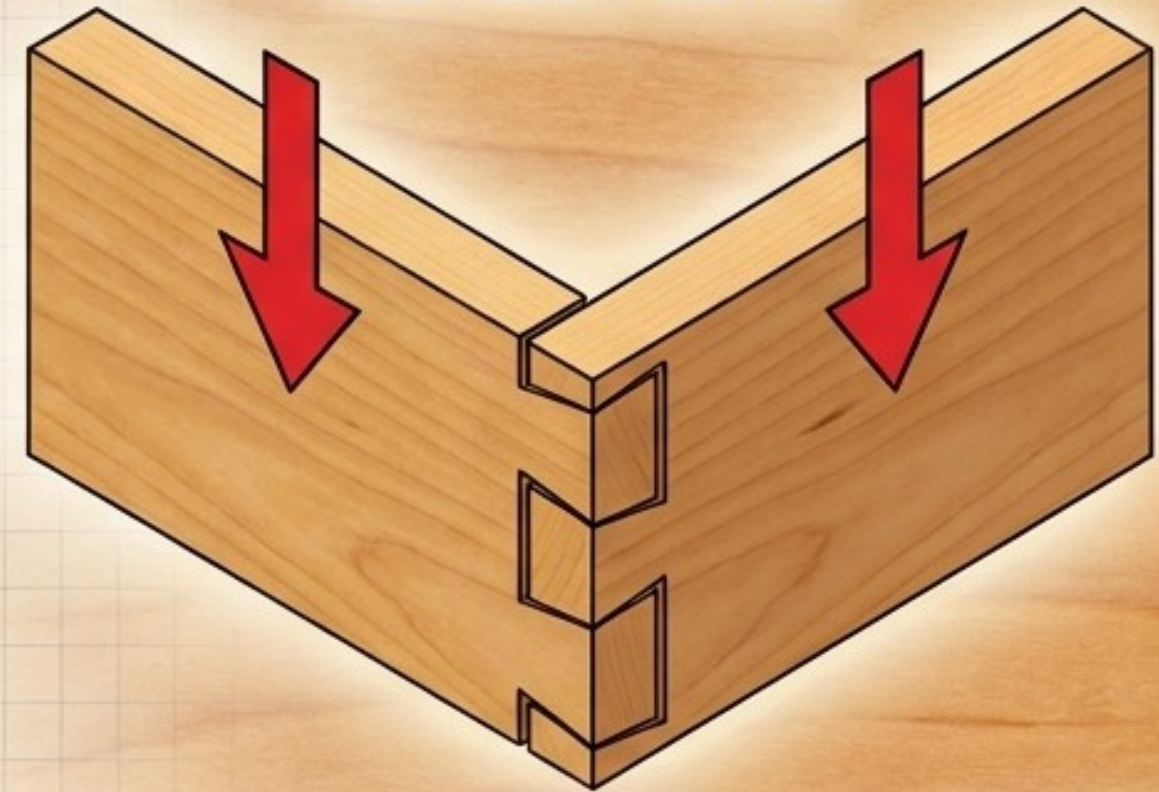
The Physics of a Dovetail

Standard Glued Butt Joint



Mass-produced cabinets rely on glue and staples (butt joints) to hold drawers together. Over time, the repeated force of opening a heavy drawer breaks the adhesive bond.

Dovetail Joint

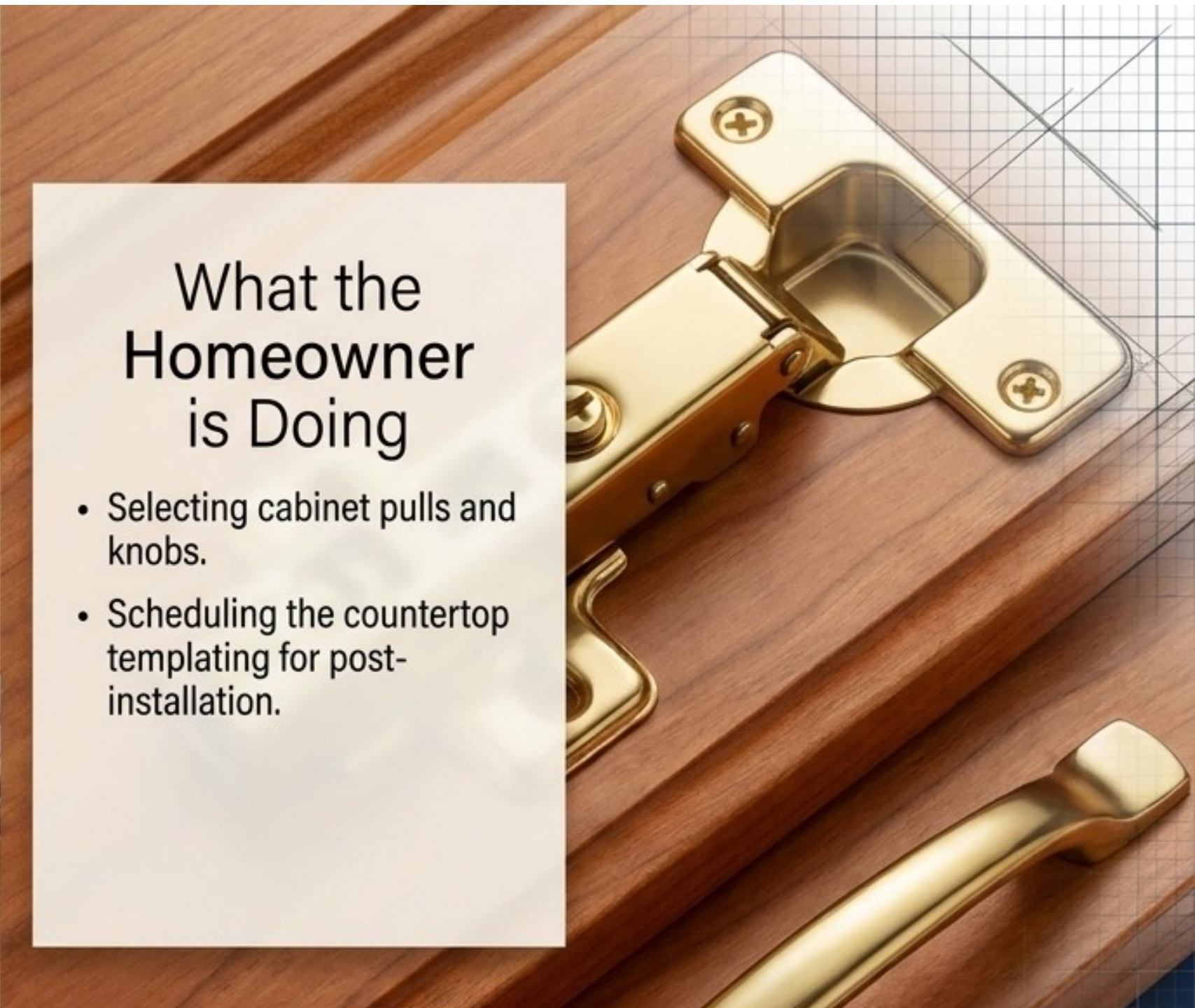


Dovetail joinery utilizes precision-cut interlocking pins and tails. The physical shape of the wood bears the tension, meaning the heavier the load, the tighter the joint holds.



What the Craftsman is Doing

- Sanding, staining, or painting using moisture-resistant, kiln-dried finishes.
- Installing tracks, hinges, and drawer glides.
- Conducting rigorous quality inspections on every moving part.



What the Homeowner is Doing

- Selecting cabinet pulls and knobs.
- Scheduling the countertop templating for post-installation.

Quality Checkpoints: Hardware & Paint

Verify that all hardware is designated soft-close to prevent door sagging and slamming. Ensure finishes are furniture-grade; avoid MDF doors painted to mimic wood, as their edges will inevitably swell in humid months.

Week 6: Preparing your home for the physical transformation

What the Craftsman is Doing

- Laying down extensive site protection (floors, walls).
- Removing old doors and hardware (if refacing) or preparing bare walls.
- Conducting a final verification of all wall measurements before transit.

What the Homeowner is Doing

- Clearing all items from existing cabinets.
- Creating clear pathways from the driveway to the kitchen.

Local Compliance Note

If you live in a pre-1978 home (e.g., Mountain Brook, Highland Park), EPA RRP lead-safe work practices must be observed. In designated historic districts, exterior-visible changes may require design review for period-appropriate hardware.

Weeks 7-8: The final installation and precision walkthrough

What the Craftsman is Doing

- Leveling and securing the hardwood cabinet boxes to the studs.
- Hanging doors, aligning drawer fronts, and mounting hardware.
- Executing the final walkthrough and addressing the punch list.

What the Homeowner is Doing

- Coordinating the final tie-ins for plumbing and countertops.
- Enjoying a custom space built to last a lifetime.

Permitting Note:

Countertop and plumbing tie-ins during this phase frequently trigger local building permits in Jefferson and Catawba Counties.

Why final installation requires precise, choreographed sequencing

Synchronized Install Gantt

Cabinet Box Installation

Must finish before Step 2

Countertop Templating

Cannot happen until boxes are perfectly level

Countertop Fabrication & Install

Plumbing Tie-In

Sinks and faucets cannot connect until countertops are set

A flawless finish cannot be rushed. The final weeks require strict sequential dependency.

Cabinet boxes must be perfectly leveled and anchored before a countertop template can even be measured.

Once templated, the stone is cut and installed, which finally allows the plumber to safely tie in the sink and fixtures.

The Anatomy of a Heritage Cabinet: A synthesis of time and craft

The Box

Kiln-dried solid hardwood selected for ultimate humidity stability (Executed Week 1).

The Drawers

Precision-milled dovetail joinery for unyielding mechanical strength (Executed Week 2).

The Hardware

Premium soft-close tracks and hinges perfectly calibrated (Executed Weeks 7-8).

The Exterior

Furniture-grade, moisture-resistant finishes applied in a controlled environment (Executed Weeks 3-5).

Compressed Timelines
